NEW FUNDS IN 2008:

Pat McMahon Memorial Fund

Established to accumulate capital donations for which the income has been designated to support female individuals that demonstrate community leadership in Yellowknife and civic pride or who demonstrate uniqueness in promoting Yellowknife or who wish to pursue studies in Tourism, Public Administration and/or Political Science.

NWT Mining Heritage Trust Fund

Established to accumulate capital donations for which the income has been designated to the operation, maintenance and improvements of any facilities operated by the NWT Mining Heritage Society.

Walter Gibbins Memorial Fund

Established to accumulate capital donations for which the income has been designated to the care and maintenance of the Walter Gibbins Mineral Collection and display cases, and geological education and awareness in the Northwest Territories.

A gift to the Yellowknife Community Fund enables the Foundation to fulfill its mission to enhance the quality of life of the citizens of Yellowknife. Founded in 1993, the Yellowknife Community Fund awards grants in the areas of social services, health, arts, education, and the environment.

The fund pools individual contributions so that collectively they can make a significant social impact.

Some of the projects and agencies that have benefited from the Fund include the Canadian Hard of Hearing Association, the Yellowknife Seniors' Society, Weledeh Breakfast Program, and K'alemi Dene School.

Donors may make contributions to the Fund in their own name, in the name of a loved one they wish to be remembered, in the name of another person to mark a special occasion or as a gift. Donors may direct the Foundation to issue the tax receipt to themselves or to the people in whose honour they are making the contribution.

The Foundation solicits and accepts grant applications from organizations that meet certain guidelines. A Grants Committee evaluates applications and makes its recommendations to the Board of Directors. The Board awards grants four times annually, within the parameters of the funds available and the mission of the Foundation.

Pat McMahon Memorial Fund

Patricia (Pat) McMahon grew up in Northern Canada and resided in Yellowknife from 1968 until her untimely death in 2008. As a Councillor of the City of Yellowknife for seven years, Pat served on all of the Council committees and as a volunteer for many community organizations. She was elected Mayor of the City of Yellowknife for three terms, serving from 1987 to 1994.


Her personal commitment to Yellowknife and the Northwest Territories resulted in appointments to many local, regional, territorial, national and international committees and organizations over the years including President of the Northwest Territories Association of Municipalities, and President of the Livable Winter Cities Association.

In 1983, Pat was presented with the NWT Tourism Award by the Government of the Northwest Territories, and in 1992 she received the Commemorative Medal of Canada 125 from the Commissioner of the NWT on behalf of the Governor General.

Pat served as Ship's Sponsor of the HMCS YELLOWKNIFE for ten years and was involved in countless other volunteer efforts in the community, showing the same relentless energy and enthusiasm for every cause.

In honour of her many contributions to the community, the City of Yellowknife has named a new street McMahon Court, and renamed the Frame Lake Trail as the "McMahon Frame Lake Trail".

Lilly Borges-Oldham Second Language Scholarship Fund

Born to German immigrant parents, Lilly knew first hand the importance of a second – and third – language. Her passion for life, languages and learning were clearly evident in her world travels with her husband Stuart, and in her exceptional contributions to education in the Northwest Territories.

Lilly inspired a generation of young Yellowknifers with her passions for languages, cultures and lifelong learning. She was dedicated to her students, her colleagues and her profession and was instrumental in the development of the French immersion program in Yellowknife. Lilly will be remembered for her energy, enthusiasm, courage, strength and "no nonsense" approach to life.

Lilly died two days before her 49th birthday after a courageous battle with cancer.

Enough Talk, Hurry Up and Do It Already Arts Scholarship

Dustin Milligan, TV and film actor originally from Yellowknife, initiated the "Enough Talk, Hurry Up and Do It Already Arts Scholarship" to help Sir John Franklin High School graduating students pursuing postsecondary studies in the dramatic arts, film or writing.

Walter Gibbins Memorial Fund

Walter Gibbins was born in Winnipeg in 1940, and received his B.Sc. from the University of Manitoba, M.Sc. from Northwestern University (Illinois) and Ph.D. from MacMaster University. He worked for the NWT Geological Division of the Department of Indian Affairs in Yellowknife from 1974 until his death in 1992.

Walter was a very well-known figure in geology and mining circles. He was a district geologist and part of his work involved training northerners in geology and prospecting. He specialized in soapstone and other carving

stone, and worked closely with Inuit carvers from many NWT communities and settlements (some of which are now in Nunavut). Walter also published several papers on geology, primarily the geology of the NWT.

Walter's interest in geology is perhaps best expressed in the extensive rock and mineral collection he accumulated throughout his career. The Walter Gibbins Memorial Fund was established for the maintenance of the Walter Gibbins Rock and Mineral Collection and the display cases used to house the collection, as well as for geological education

and awareness in the NWT. The rock and mineral collection is maintained by the NWT Mining Heritage Society and has been displayed in a number of locations in the City of Yellowknife. The collection will ultimately be housed in the NWT Mining Heritage Centre.

The Walter Gibbins Memorial Fund was launched with a \$25,000 donation from the Walter Gibbins Trust Fund in March, 2008.

Mary Beth Miller Memorial Fund

Mary Beth Miller was born August 24, 1976 and moved to Yellowknife with her family when she was six years old.

Always an athlete, Mary Beth was involved in many sports and activities throughout her youth. Her parents supported her pursuits and provided whatever assistance they could to the sporting clubs which Mary Beth was participating in.

Mary Beth was an enthusiastic and spirited athlete – constantly challenging herself and

her teammates to strive to achieve their best, although it was more important to Mary Beth that people took pleasure in the experience.

Mary Beth died July 2, 2000, as a result of a bear attack while training at the Miriam Bedard Biathlon Centre in Val Cartier, Quebec.

Mary Beth's family established the Mary Beth Miller Memorial Fund to support athletes who demonstrate the qualities that Mary Beth exhibited in her approach to life.

David Sutherland Memorial Fund

David learned to cross-country ski in Inuvik in the 1960s after arriving from BC to start a job with the Government. He learned to ski from oblate priest Father Mouchet and was involved with the internationally-recognized Territorial Experimental Ski Training Program (TEST) Program in Inuvik. After moving to Yellowknife, he worked with the local and territorial ski programs coaching young skiers.

David thought that cross-country skiing was an excellent sport for young people. Along with the fitness aspects of physical training, he believed that skiing developed other skills – discipline, goal setting, and perseverance.

David Sutherland passed away on Oct. 12, 2004, from cancer. This fund was established in David's memory by the Sutherland family and the Yellowknife Ski Club, so that he could continue to help young northern skiers.

Chris Argue Memorial Fund

Chris was born in Churchill, Manitoba, in 1976, and was a proud Yellowknifer from age four. Chris loved his family and friends and enjoyed cabin life at Prelude Lake.. Chris was active in student government at Sir John Franklin High School and was instrumental in starting Dry Grad. At the time of his accidental death at the age of 25, he was studying engineering at the University of Alberta.

Chris had a passion for life and a deep love of the wilderness. Fearless but thorough in tackling new challenges, he brought leadership, intelligence, ingenuity and concern for others to everything he did. Chris' family has chosen to honour his memory by establishing a fund to promote the development of leadership skills and self-confidence in self-propelled wilderness travel in the NWT.

Jenny Gamble-Fournier Memorial Scholarship Fund

Jenny Gamble-Fournier was a little girl when her family moved to Yellowknife in 1978. After graduating high school, she spent a year in Europe and then went on to complete Carleton University's journalism program, although her real passion was art history. She worked in Yellowknife briefly before returning to Europe to be with her fiancé, Chris Fournier. Jenny and Chris were married less than two months before she succumbed to bone cancer in 1999.

A talented painter and poet with passionate spirit, Jenny was very proud of her Northern roots. In her memory, friends and family established a scholarship fund for students pursuing a post-secondary education, with an emphasis on the arts. The Fund provides annual scholarships to students of Yellowknife's Sir John Franklin High School with high levels of academic achievement, well-rounded character and wide interests.

Gary Robinson was born in Yellowknife in 1981. During his school years, he was eager to begin working for his family's transportation and construction business. Upon graduating from Sir John Franklin High School he focused on his career, gaining a broad range of skills and earning the respect of those with and for whom he worked.

The passion Gary felt for his work was intertwined with his love of Yellowknife. There was no place else he would have rather lived. He saw opportunities here for those who were willing to work hard.

Gary approached recreation with the same zeal. Each new season brought boundless opportunities for spending time out on the

Gary enjoyed sharing moments with his family and friends while camping, hunting, fishing, snowboarding – he loved it all.

Preparedness was always important to Gary. He strived to be self-sufficient with the right skills and equipment. He was known to come to the aid of anyone in need, strangers or friends. He was quick to help others and quicker yet to make little of the deed.

In the winter of 2004, at the age of 23, Gary was accidentally killed doing the work he loved. His memorial fund provides financial support to those individuals or charitable organizations involved in search and rescue/recovery or emergency response activities. Through this fund, it is his family's hope that Gary will continue to protect and help the people of this place that he loved so much.

Northern Aviation Scholarship Fund

Originally established to commemorate the life of John Bidwell, and more recently the memory of Jim Smith, this fund is intended to provide scholarships to individuals who aspire to a career in aviation in the north.

Captain John Ernest Bidwell

Born in Scotland, John came to the NWT for the first time in 1981 flying a single Twin Otter for Lamb Air. Over the years he worked for La Ronge Aviation in Saskatchewan, then in Yellowknife. He flew medevacs and charters for Latham

Island Airways, operated Imperial Aviation and then flew as a contract pilot for North-Wright Airways, Arctic Sunwest and Adlair Aviation Ltd. He became the base manager and chief pilot for Summit Air in YK. His life was taken in a tragic accident near Port Radium NWT, on October 8, 2000.

Captain James Smith Jim grew up in Winnipeg, and moved to Rankin Inlet in the 1970s to work as a pilot for Keewatin Air. Jim stayed in Rankin Inlet for seven years, then took a position with Air Manitoba

based in Churchill. He flew King Airs and DC-4s, and became recognized for his ability to perfectly load and land airplanes safely in remote communities. In the late '80s he worked for Kenn Borek Air, flying throughout the north. He even led a flight to Antarctica – landing the first DC-4 on wheels. His final contract was with Buffalo Airways, where he took the position of Chief Pilot early and obtained Check Pilot authority.

Both men will be long remembered for their professional expertise and positive influences on young pilots



It is Loraine's complete devotion to her family and her insatiable passion for gardening that will be especially remembered by all those who knew and loved her. It was Loraine's wish that a Garden of Hope, planted in her memory, would be a place of peace and comfort, especially for those with breast cancer and their families. The Garden of Hope was planted in the spring of 2003 at a site selected by Loraine and will be maintained in perpetuity.

The Foundation Supports Our Community Through Grants

Individuals and organizations can apply to the Foundation for grants for projects of benefit to the citizens of Yellowknife. The Foundation awards grants in support of projects that:

- Advance the welfare of the needy and alleviate human suffering and poverty;
- Assist and promote arts and cultural activities;
- Promote education;
- Assist sport, recreation and community development;
- Assist and advance the provision of medical services; and
- Assist and advance other community activities or facilities of a charitable nature.

Organizations or individuals seeking grants or awards can find a copy of the Foundation's Grant Guidelines on our website at www. yellowknifecommunityfoundation.ca.

Requests should be made in writing to the Yellowknife Community Foundation, Box 1620, 4918 50th Street, Yellowknife, NT X1A 2P2

All applications are reviewed and considered by the Board of Directors. We request that grant seekers make their application well in advance of their need for funding. Applications to the Yellowknife Community Fund are considered four times per year. Applications should be submitted:

- by Mar 1 for projects starting after Apr 15
 by May 15 for projects starting after Apr 15
- by May 15 for projects starting after Aug 15
- by Sept 1 for projects starting after Oct 15 by Dec 1 for projects starting after Jan 15

The deadline for applications to the memorial funds is May 15 each year.

Administration Endowment Fund

The Yellowknife Community Foundation is administered by a volunteer board of directors who are assisted with day-to-day operations by volunteers and donated professional and administrative services. By operating out of donated office space, and having no paid staff, the Foundation is able to minimize its administrative costs and maximize its grantmaking ability.

However, a number of operating expenses simply cannot be avoided, such as the cost of paper, postage, copies, printing and other office expenses. As the Foundation cannot spend the capital of any charitable donation it receives, it must pay for these expenses from the interest earned on donations to its Administration Endowment Fund.

Donations to this Fund will help to ensure the Foundation has the resources to carry out its mandate. An enhanced Fund would enable the Foundation to engage in other additional beneficial activities which it currently cannot afford, such as the production of promotional materials, paid advertising and even paid staff.

Fine and Performing Arts Fund

Kids Unlimited, a Yellowknife non-profit society that offered drama, art and other recreational programs for children and youth during the 1980s and early 1990s, established a permanent Fine and Performing Arts Fund with the Yellowknife Community Foundation in 1999.

Earnings from the fund are used to support the development of NWT residents in the fine and performing arts. Scholarships are available each year for those pursuing artistic excellence in drama, dance, music and theatre arts, including technical production, studio arts, film or photography.

Generous donations from the Yellowknife City Band in 2000 and the Community Television Society in 2008 added significant contributions to the original Fund.



Don first came to Yellowknife in 1945 to join the Dominion Geological Service crew. He returned to become a geologist at the Con mine.

In 1972, Don became a consulting geologist. In this capacity, this work took him to Egypt, England, Scotland, Ireland, Australia, the United States, and across Canada, including the NWT. He never lost his love of the north.

Don returned to Yellowknife for the 50th Anniversary celebration in the company of his wife. Alice, so that she could have the opportunity to "see and feel" the north. Alice promptly "fell in love with the city and its friendly people."

Don passed away in June 2003. He left a sizeable beguest to the Yellowknife Community Foundation that will continue to give back to the north he loved.
