

#### Walter Gibbins Memorial Fund

Walter Gibbins was born in Winnipeg in 1940, and received his B.Sc. from the University of Manitoba, M.Sc. from Northwestern University (Illinois) and Ph.D. from MacMaster University. He worked for the NWT Geological Division of the Department of Indian Affairs in Yellowknife from 1974 until his death in 1992. Walter was a very well-known figure in geology and mining circles. He was a district geologist and part of his work involved training northerners in geology and prospecting. He specialized in soapstone and other carving stone, and worked closely with Inuit carvers from many NWT communities and settlements (some of which are now in Nunavut). Walter also published several papers on geology, primarily the geology of the NWT.

Walter's interest in geology is perhaps best expressed in the extensive rock and mineral collection he accumulated throughout his career. The Walter Gibbins Memorial Fund was established for the maintenance of the Walter Gibbins Rock and Mineral Collection and the display cases used to house the collection, as well as for geological education and awareness in the NWT. The rock and mineral collection is maintained by the NWT Mining Heritage Society and has been

displayed in a number of locations in the City of Yellowknife. The collection will ultimately be housed in the NWT Mining Heritage Centre.

The Walter Gibbins Memorial Fund was launched with a \$25,000 donation from the Walter Gibbins Trust Fund in March, 2008.

#### Pat McMahon Memorial Fund

Patricia (Pat) McMahon grew up in Northern Canada and resided in Yellowknife from 1968 until her untimely death in 2008. As a Councillor of the City of Yellowknife for seven years, Pat served on all of the Council committees and as a volunteer for many community organizations. She was elected Mayor of the City of Yellowknife for three terms, serving from 1987 to 1994.

Her personal commitment to Yellowknife and the Northwest Territories resulted



in appointments to many local, regional, territorial, national and international committees and organizations over the years including President of the Northwest Territories Association of Municipalities, and President of the Livable Winter Cities Association.

In 1983, Pat was presented with the NWT Tourism Award by the Government of the Northwest Territories, and in 1992 she received the Commemorative Medal of Canada 125 from the Commissioner of the NWT on behalf of the Governor General.

Pat served as Ship's Sponsor of the HMCS YELLOWKNIFE for ten years and was involved in countless other volunteer efforts in the community, showing the same relentless energy and enthusiasm for every cause.

In honour of her many contributions to the community, the City of Yellowknife has named a new street McMahon Court, Fire and Ice by Linda Whitford

and renamed the Frame Lake Trail as the "McMahon Frame Lake Trail".

The Pat McMahon Memorial Fund was established by her family to support female individuals that demonstrate community leadership in Yellowknife and civic pride, who demonstrate uniqueness in promoting Yellowknife or who wish to pursue studies in Tourism, Public Administration and/or Political Science.

Always an athlete, Mary Beth was involved in many sports and activities throughout her youth. Her parents supported her pursuits and provided whatever assistance they could to the sporting clubs which Mary Beth was participating in.

Mary Beth was an enthusiastic and spirited athlete - constantly challenging herself and her teammates to strive to achieve their best, although it was more important to Mary Beth that people took pleasure in the experience.

#### **David Sutherland Memorial Fund**

David learned to cross-country ski in Inuvik in the 1960s after arriving from BC to start a job with the Government. He learned to ski from oblate priest Father Mouchet and was involved with the internationally-recognized Territorial Experimental Ski Training Program (TEST) Program in Inuvik. After moving to Yellowknife, he worked with the local and territorial ski programs coaching young skiers.

David thought that cross-country skiing was an excellent sport for young people. Along with the fitness aspects of physical training, he believed that skiing developed other skills - discipline, goal setting, and perseverance.

David Sutherland passed away on Oct. 12, 2004, from cancer. This fund was established in David's memory by the Sutherland family and the Yellowknife Ski Club, so that he could continue to help young northern skiers.


### Northern Aviation Scholarship Fund





Upon graduating from Sir John Franklin High School he focused on his career, gaining a broad range of skills and earning the respect of those with and for whom he worked. The passion Gary felt for his work was intertwined with his love of Yellowknife. There was no place else he would have rather lived. He saw opportunities here for those who were willing to work hard.

Gary approached recreation with the same zeal. Each new season brought boundless opportunities for spending time out on the land. Gary enjoyed sharing moments with his family and friends while camping, hunting, fishing, snowboarding – he loved it all.

Preparedness was always important to Gary. He strived to be self-sufficient with the right skills and equipment. He was known to come to the aid of anyone in need, strangers or friends. He was quick to help others and quicker yet to make little of the deed. In the winter of 2004, at the age of 23, Gary was accidentally killed doing the work he loved. His memorial fund provides financial support to those individuals or charitable organizations involved in search and rescue/

- Assist and advance other community activities or facilities of a charitable nature.

Applications to the Yellowknife Community Fund are considered four times per year. Applications should be submitted:

- by Mar 1 for projects starting after Apr 15
- by May 15 for projects starting after Aug 15
- by Sept 1 for projects starting after Oct 15
- by Dec 1 for projects starting after Jan 15

The deadline for applications to the memorial funds is May 15 each year.

#### Administration Endowment Fund

The Yellowknife Community Foundation is administered by a volunteer board of directors who are assisted with day-today operations by volunteers and donated professional and administrative services. By operating out of donated office space, and having no paid staff, the Foundation is able to minimize its administrative costs and maximize its grant-making ability.

However, a number of operating expenses simply cannot be avoided, such as the cost of postage, printing and other office expenses. As the Foundation cannot spend the capital of any charitable donation it receives, it must pay for these expenses from the interest earned on donations to its Administration Endowment Fund.

Donations to this Fund will help to ensure the Foundation has the resources to carry out its mandate. An enhanced Fund would enable the Foundation to engage in other additional beneficial activities which it currently cannot afford, such as the production of promotional materials, paid advertising and even paid staff.
